Franklin Sollars, PhD.: Sigmund Freud and the Jewish Mystical Tradition

Freud eschewed religion, seeing no place for it in his dynamic psychology. Yet “unconsciously” the heritage of mystical Judaism influenced and shaped both Freud’s ideas and his technique of treatment. Franklin Sollars PhD is a psychologist/ psychoanalyst in private practice in Birmingham MI and President of The Michigan Society for Integrative Psychoanalytic Studies. He is Associate Professor at the Michigan School of Professional Psychology.

Lynn Halper Rosen PhD and Rabbi Baruch Cohen: The Maimonides Method

“The Maimonides Method is a self-help behavioral psychology developed by Rabbi Baruch Cohen, based on the writings of the 12th century scholar Moses Maimonides, who combined Talmudic and medical knowledge in his deep understanding of human behavior. Lynn Halper Rosen PhD is a psychologist in private practice in Birmingham and the Founder of the Mother’s Resource Center of Birmingham/Bloomfield. Rabbi Baruch Cohen lives in Birmingham with his family and is the spiritual leader of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Chai Center.

Rabbi Joshua Bennett and Julie August: Mussar and Spiritual Change

Mussar is a 10th century Jewish philosophy which advocates reaching God through correct ethical thought and action. Once only available to Jewish scholars, it has recently been translated into a modern idiom and made accessible to the public. Rabbi Joshua Bennett is a spiritual leader at Temple Israel, and Julie August is a yoga teacher and a Vice-President at Temple Israel. Both are certified teachers of Mussar.

Rabbi Howard Avruhm Addison. PhD: Kabbalah and the Enneagram

Kabbalah is an ancient Jewish spiritual tradition. The Enneagram is a dynamic personality system that describes nine different fundamental patterns of feeling, thinking, and actions. This daylong workshop addresses the interface between these two systems, and how to use it for personal growth and working with clients in the helping professions. Rabbi Howard Addison PhD is an Assistant Professor in the Intellectual Heritage Department at Temple University. A congregational Rabbi for 30 years, he is the author two books on the interface between Kabbalah and the Enneagram. He is a founding teacher of the Lev Shomea Institute for training Jewish Spiritual Directors, and co-edited the recent anthology Jewish Spiritual Direction.
